J. Monash cut ties with US military

Preamble:

Monash University has in the past year received approximately 17 million AUD in grants and program sponsorship from the US Department of Defence. The overwhelming majority of these ties are predicated on direct provision of militarily-applicable research by Monash faculties to specific US Defence branches.

It is unacceptable that Monash accepts millions in grants from an aggressive imperialist power to conduct research for their military. These research ties contribute directly to the militarism and authoritarianism being promoted by Donald Trump and his movement. Simultaneously, Trump's White House has targeted academic research deemed "woke", resulting in direct threats to important research funding at Monash and other Australian universities. This is an egregious attack on academic freedom aimed to promote reactionary culture-war politics. Instead of standing against Trump's right-wing attacks, Monash Vice Chancellor Sharon Pickering recently affirmed that "The door is open at Monash" to supporting AUKUS, another aggressive militaristic venture between the Australian and American governments.

Monash's military ties fit into a broader context of Australian military integration with the United States. The Tindal air base in the Northern Territory is currently being upgraded to host 6 nuclear-capable US B-52 bombers. Intelligence from the Pine Gap military base has been used to aid Israeli operations in Gaza, and Australian air bases have been used to facilitate the illegal bombing of Yemen. Furthermore, the Trump administration is driving an aggressive push towards militarisation around the world, and aggressively intervening to promote right-wing politics internationally. Far from keeping us safe, military build-up and further integration between the Australian and American militaries drive us closer to war.

Students for Palestine have called a national day of Protest to cut ties with Trump's America. The protest has been endorsed by the National Union of Students. Trump's aggressive attacks on 'wokeness' have already impacted university research in Australia, and Monash's defence research is inseparably linked to the increasing imperialist integration between Australia and America. It is important that students attend this rally to demonstrate their opposition to Trump's reactionary militaristic agenda, and its relationship to higher education in Australia.

Lana speaks to the motion and raises a point of contention with previous speakers. Lana notes agreement with the preamble however criticises the rally itself as more damaging for the muslim and arabic community than it is helpful. Beck exercises a right of reply and disagrees with the characterisation that the rally is performing the role of advertisement for students for Palestine. Max seconds the point.

Lana retorts and asks that it be noted in the minutes that she cannot support a rally that in its organisational capacity does not engage with the communities it is seeking to represent and advocate for.

John. S proposes a middle ground where Students For Palestine branding is removed from the motion. Beck rejects this and Max agrees, characterising the idea as childish. Felix speaks to the value of amending action point 2. John. S states that if the true intention of the motion is to promote a rally, the inclusion of Students For Palestine is irrelevant. Felix agrees.

Jay notes that speaking time is running out and that the amendment would need to be raised shortly.

K. Regulations for Office-Bearers and Members of MSA Bodies Role Outlines

The Role Outlines in the Regulations for Office-Bearers and Members of MSA Bodies are outdated. They include responsibilities that are no longer relevant and omit duties that have since become central to the roles. As a result, they no longer accurately reflect the current scope of Office-Bearer positions.

Felix explains the intention behind the motion and outlines grammatical errors, along with outdated regulations sometimes up a decade old. Jay clarifies that the regulations apply only to MSA office bearers including Lot's Wife. Leroy speaks to the fact that no role outlines exist for certain departments including Residential Community.

Charlotte agrees and highlights the lack of a role description available to potential candidates before they run for election as MSA office bearers. Jay seconds this.

Remus also agrees and expresses the challenges that exist where no set frameworks exist for office bearer departments.

Georgie asks when the new outlines will be tables, and Felix responds that this will occur at the earliest convenience.

L. We need schools, not prisons!

Preamble:

The Victorian Labor government has secretly delayed \$2.4 billion worth of state school funding by three years[1]. Jacinta Allan buried this in last year's budget but the news surfaced last week.

On the same day, Allan announced another \$727 million worth of funding to state prisons and youth justice centres, promising 1,000 new prison beds[2]. This has come after new bail laws were introduced this year, Allan bragging they're the "toughest in the country"[3]. In every way, the state Labor government is funnelling more people into prison, for longer and harsher sentences.

For decades, countless reviews into the education sector have declared public schools severely underfunded. 98% of public schools are funded below the Schooling Resource Standard (SRS), which is the minimum amount governments have agreed is required to meet the needs of all students[4].

On top of this, three quarters of Victoria's private schools get more public funding than public schools[5]. When you add the exorbitant fees that elite private schools charge, Victorian private schools end up with 70% more recurrent income to spend per student than public schools – the largest gap in the nation[6]. Allan's decision to delay funding to public schools and the government's failure to address underfunding has resulted in one of the most unfair and unequal education systems in OECD countries.

The Australian Education Union Victorian branch president rightly called this unacceptable. He said if public schools were fully funded, they "would be able to employ more teachers and education support staff to address shortages, reduce class sizes, boost wellbeing programs, and ensure every student gets more individual attention."[7]

Instead, Labor's "pathway to fully funding schools by 2034" predictably looks like another "net zero emissions by 2050". An empty promise that can be pushed further and further into the future while poor and working class children pay the price.

Government funds should be used to properly fund our schools so that quality education is accessible to everyone, not just the rich. And government funds shouldn't be used to lock

more kids up in so-called 'youth justice' centres. We need more funding for essential services that actually benefit the lives of ordinary people.

O. Flexible contract terms for on campus accommodation

Preamble:

While the MSA acknowledges that MRS offering fixed 42 week contracts offers many students stability and certainty for housing this agreement is not ideal for all students.

Should a resident choose to leave they will have to pay rent until their room is filled from the MRS official wait list. This limits the accommodation options for students who aim to finish their studies in the 1st semester of the year as they are also required to vacate once they are no longer a student. While aligning contracts with the university's academic calendar has many benefits, MRS should also offer contract options that accommodate students commencing studies in non-traditional periods, such as winter, in recognition of the university's shift towards more flexible study options.

Furthermore, Monash is a global university with campuses and partner universities worldwide, all of which students are encouraged to study overseas at, and vice versa. The GIG program and offering of a Global Studies degree reinforce this concept to students. However 42 week lock in contracts limit students who have no other options for accommodation but wish to study abroad. This compounds the financial burden and stress of planning such an experience.

As Monash courses and degree structures move towards more flexible study so should on campus accommodation. Students should not be forced into contracts when they know they cannot complete the full term because of their course structure.

John. S speaks to the fact that some welfare based housing opportunities do in fact exist, though that they should be made more readily accessible.

M. Lot's Wife Reports

Preamble:

The nature of student governance requires the highest degree of transparency, not only as the student representatives that serve on these bodies are elected by their fellow students, but because the funding for these bodies comes from the pockets of students.

Students deserve to know what their money is being spent on, and what their elected representatives are doing. Whilst there are a number of measures to achieve this desired transparency the most accessible comes through reports to Lot's Wife – which has a digital readership in the tens of thousands in addition to those that read printed editions. It is therefore extremely disappointing that in the past two editions there has been a lacklustre return of reports. More concerning still, is that the reports received every edition tend to come from the same departments, ergo the reports we don't receive also come from the same departments.

The Regulations for Office-Bearers and Members of M.S.A. Bodies stipulate that reports must be provided to every edition of Lot's Wife per regulation 8.9. Similarly, regulation 17.4.2 prescribes a range of disciplinary measures for failure to comply with this requirement in two consecutive occasions. Whilst these measures have not been exercised

in this instance, further failure to submit reports next semester shall result in disciplinary motions being moved.

Motion #10:

This M.S.C:

1. Notes the ~~disappointing~~ lack of reports from departments and divisions in Lot's Wife during 2025, particularly the consistent failure of a number of departments to submit reports by stipulated deadlines;
2. Acknowledges that regulation 8.9 of the Regulations for Office-Bearers and Members of M.S.A. Bodies requires that "all office-bearers... submit reports to every edition of Lot's Wife..." and by failing to do so "The M.S.C., by a resolution passed by a simple majority, may suspend, withhold, or dock the honoraria of an office-bearer for up to one week... (regulation 17.4.2) and that these disciplinary actions may be taken in future;
3. Highlights the importance of Lot's Wife reports in contributing to organisational transparency and updating the student body on the affairs of the M.S.A. in a manner conducive to mass consumption by the public;
4. ~~Recognises that it is not the responsibility of the Editors of Lot's Wife to chase office-bearers for their reports endlessly; and~~
5. Directs office-bearers to submit all future reports for the remaining editions of the year in a timely manner.

N. Recent Violence and the Ongoing Crisis Between India and Pakistan

Preamble

In light of the recent escalation of violence between India and Pakistan — and the tragic impact this has had on innocent lives on both sides — the Monash Student Association (MSA) acknowledges the immense human toll and the deep distress caused to many, especially students with ties to the region.

In the recent terrorist attack in Pahalgam, 26 people — primarily Indian tourists — were killed in a brutal assault attributed to Lashkar-e-Taiba, UN designated terrorist organisation. In response, India's retaliatory strikes have reportedly killed 36 civilians in Pakistan, including a three-year-old girl, and wounded at least 46 others.

This violence does not exist in a vacuum. It is rooted in the history of the 1947 Partition, and in the unresolved and ongoing crisis in Jammu and Kashmir — a region where entire communities have endured decades of repression, instability, and militarisation. The people of Kashmir are not merely collateral damage; they are direct victims of systemic violence and aggression.

At a time when dominant narratives often obscure or politicise this suffering, it is more important than ever to stand firmly and clearly against all forms of violence. We condemn terrorism in all its forms, and we equally condemn disproportionate retaliation that targets civilians and perpetuates cycles of harm.

This motion seeks to take a principled stance: to centre the lived experiences of Indians, Pakistanis, Kashmiris, and all those affected in the broader region; and to ensure that Monash students from these backgrounds are recognised, supported, and protected, particularly if tensions continue to escalate. In recognising these injustices, we remain grounded in the urgent and undeniable human cost.

Motion #11:

This MSC:

1. Recognises the loss of life on both sides of the border in the wake of recent violence, and acknowledges the grief and distress experienced by many in our student community.
2. Condemns all acts of terrorism and violence targeting civilians, including the recent attack in Pahalgam and the subsequent retaliatory Indian strikes that have killed and wounded innocent civilians.
3. Directs the MSA to provide targeted well-being support to affected students, including appropriate referrals and access to appropriate services.
4. Calls on Monash University to actively monitor developments in the region and to respond with appropriate, timely support should tensions escalate — including ensuring that students from affected regions are not left to navigate the impacts alone. This includes providing clear communication, well-being support, and an easily accessible special consideration process for those whose studies are disrupted.

P. General Business

Felix asks that those in the room fill out the feedback form circulating via email. Felix contends that this is a general request for feedback and that all submissions are welcome.

Charlotte raises a point of clarification as to whether or not the information garnered via the report will be publicly accessible, distributed throughout the organisation or only to the executive. Felix responds that in order to preserve the ability for all respondents to feel genuinely enabled in providing honest and perhaps personal feedback, this process be that which is preferred. Charlotte queries whether or not there will be any readily available information that outlines the nexus between sourced feedback and MSA response.

Felix again responds and outlines that he cannot commit ahead of time to a response given that the issues are varied. Charlotte asks if staff are consulted and involved in the process

and Felix clarifies that senior management of the MSA have been and that this involvement has been extensive, and that staff will further be involved should it be required per the individual case or issue in question.

Max calls for the MSC to take a solidarity photo for Allied Medical Workers who are on strike in Altona North in response to less overtime and hourly rates being granted. Felix queries if this is a motion or not. Max responds that it isn't strictly necessary and recommends the photo be taken after MSC.

Remus promotes the Stop Woodside Monash meeting this afternoon, and pivots to the matter of motion 10. Remus takes accountability for the lack of Lot's Wife reports and thanks the Lot's Wife team.
